James Chisholm, 4x great grandson of Caroline and Archibald, was a very special guest at our opening. His presence reminds us of being inspired by Caroline to be strong, determined, compassionate and gentle. I thank James for taking the time to get to know us better.

From the Moonee Valley office, we are now offering appointments for baby and maternity goods, pregnancy counselling, homelessness support and family support. We hope to soon have playgroups and parenting groups operating. We already have a knitters circle of volunteers.

I look forward to offering many more updates from Essendon, but also from our Caroline Springs and Shepparton teams. A big welcome to Maree Chin who recently started as our Goulburn Valley Lead Practitioner.

'What next?' We are focusing on quality. For the first time this year, Shepparton will be included in the scope of our three-yearly quality review. We will also be focusing on data and working towards a service record system. We hope to make it easier to know and let others know that we are helping pregnant and new mums, how we are doing that and how well. We are one of the few agencies to publish so openly our data and I look forward to ensuring that we remain at the forefront of transparency and quality service provision.

I was delighted to recently join the Deputy Premier and the members for Niddrie and Pascoe Vale at the opening of the Caroline Chisholm Society community centre on Mount Alexander Road, Essendon. **This purpose-built facility will provide a range of services and assistance for families in need, including counselling, housing, aid and in-home family support.** The Victorian government contributed \$950 000 towards this \$3.2 million project alongside community funding. The funding has allowed the Caroline Chisholm Society to set up specific spaces that cater for the different services provided — comfortable rooms for client meetings, a spacious bathroom with changing facilities and adequate space for the sorting and processing of clothes, prams, toys and food.

The Caroline Chisholm Society is a charitable organisation that was established in 1969 with a mission to provide services that respond to the needs of families and support them to achieve and maintain a safe and nurturing environment.
